

DELAWARE CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

On Sunday, September 10th Delaware City Lions Club (DE), in conjunction with Delaware City Fire Company collected supplies for Houston Texas Area schools affected by Hurricane Harvey. It was reported in The Houston Chronicle that 245 area schools suffered some type of damage (53 suffering 'major' damage, and 22 receiving extensive damage). The Delaware City community answered the call, and turned out to support this endeavor. Approximately 10 boxes of supplies were collected at the event and in the days that followed. Cash donations were also received to buy additional supplies. State Senator Nicole Poore graciously secured shipping of the collected supplies at no cost to the two non-profits. Thanks to everyone who contributed to ease the burden on Houston area schools during this significant weather event.

All sidewalks must be cleared of snow/ice within 24 hours of the end of the snowfall. Snow is not permitted to be deposited in the street or gutters. A \$25.00 fine will be issued to any property in violation of this ordinance – City Code Chapter 8, Sections 10-12.

☐ The One-Step Flood Risk Profile to provide an estimation of a property's flood risk and direct residents to local insurance agents, who can provide additional information on a flood insurance policy.

- Paperboard (cereal/tissue boxes)
- Corrugated Cardboard (flattened)
- Narrow-Neck plastic bottles (examples: milk jugs, bleach/detergent, shampoo bottles)
- Plastic Grocery Bags
- Glass Bottles/Jars (any color)
- Metal Cans (tin, steel and aluminum)


