## **CITY MANAGER'S MESSAGE**

This past May 31<sup>st</sup> marked a year since I began serving as the City Manager here in Delaware City. It has been a busy and rewarding year for me, getting to know residents and business owners, understanding the inner workings of the organization and working with the Mayor and Council on issues impacting the community.

I am happy to say that the start of the new fiscal year this month also brought more clarity to our financial situation, and stronger awareness of areas that we need to focus on. To that end, the city will engage in a state required Comprehensive Plan Update, due to the State of Delaware Planning Office in November of next year.

This ten-year plan update will provide opportunities to share your thoughts and concerns at various outreach events and engagements. Your participation in this process is important to ensure Delaware City continues to address the needs and interests of its residents. The first engagement opportunity will take place at Delaware City Day, on July 21st and will be positioned alongside the Information Booth in front of the Post Office. Please plan to stop by our booth!

While space doesn't allow to log all that we have been working on, the most impactful include:

- Completion of a financial accounting review and recent launch of an improved software system.
- Evaluation of our water utility with future decisions regarding its operations expected later this year.
- Reenergized the halted Washington Street Flood Mitigation Project with construction currently underway and expected to be completed by early 2019 this important project benefited early on from substantial grant funding from FEMA, and the New Castle Conservation District, and more recently from low interest state revolving loans and end of session grant funding support from DNREC sought and garnered by Representative Longhurst.

## FORT DUPONT ...Jeff Randol

In 2014 the Fort DuPont Redevelopment and Preservation Corporation was created by the General Assembly to take ownership of the 405-acre complex known since 1948 as the Governor Bacon Health Center. The complex is now being redeveloped as a mixed use lifestyle and destination community. New housing will soon be underway with a spec home on Officers Row and model home in the Canal District starting this fall. Plans are to build 85 homes over the next 5 years in the Canal District and Officers Row subdivisions along with ongoing restoration of historic residences.



Road and infrastructure improvements are underway in the Canal District and along the main road, which is scheduled to be reconstructed and paved this summer and fall.



Preservation of the historic structures is a high priority. On Battery Lane, the Corporation has entered into an agreement to sell the twelve residential units across from the Surplus building. Renovations are expected to start on these units in the fall along with the completion this year of 3 more buildings.




Marina designs have been completed and submitted for permitting. The plan is to add 120 slips to the Branch Canal and create a Marina Village that will include a Hotel and Conference Center, restaurant and apartments.

Flood plain management is another infrastructure improvement underway. The Canal District and Officers Row districts are being filled with dirt and raised out of the flood plain. The Marina Village will be raised as well. Plans to protect the balance of the site from flooding require a levee, which will also serve as an elevated bike path. The levee construction will start next year and will basically circle the primary area of development and preservation. The elevated bike path will add to the recreational amenities of the site and expand opportunities for those using the Castle Trail.

These are just a few of the highlights of what's happening at Fort DuPont.

## CODE RED EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

The City of Delaware City has implemented an Emergency Notification System, **Code Red.** It is designed to notify our residents of various types of emergencies such as: bad weather; flooding; natural disasters and emergency information from the police and fire departments.

#### **DELMARVA POWER**

#### **SUMMER PREPAREDNESS**

Delmarva Power is hard at work prepping their systems and testing their processes and procedures in their effort to provide safe and reliable service for their customers all summer long. In addition to modernizing and reinforcing the local energy grid, they are conducting emergency response drills and complete testing of computer and emergency systems as part of their season preparedness efforts.

Just like Delmarva Power prepares for summer, customers should also be ready too. Summer storms can result in power outages, and customers can take a few simple steps to be ready:

Assemble an emergency storm kit. Include a battery-powered radio, flashlight, extra batteries, a first-aid kit, special needs items, and
a list of emergency phone numbers.



- Have at least a three-day supply of bottled water and easy-to-prepare nonperishable foods.
- Identify a safe alternate location in case of an extended outage.
- Visit delmarva.com/mobileapp and download our mobile app to report outages or other service issues and stay up to date should summer storms cause a service interruption to your home or business.
- Remember, always stay away from any storm damaged electrical equipment, especially downed power lines. Customers are asked to immediately report a downed wire by calling 1-800-898-8042.
- Review the manufacturer's instructions for safe operation of your generator. Do not connect a generator directly to your home's wiring. Never us a generator indoors, in an attached garage or other enclosed area.

When summer temperatures rise, customers also can take simple steps to help keep their energy costs down:



- Turn it off: Turn off all unnecessary lighting and devices.
- Manage our thermostat: Keep thermostats at a constant, comfortable level when at home. Raise the thermostat setting for
  days of extreme heat to save even more. Install a programmable thermostat to atomically adjust your home's temperature settings
  when you're away or sleeping.



- Keep shades, blinds and curtains closed: About 40% of unwanted heat comes through windows. Simply closing blinds and curtains, which act as a layer of insulation, can reduce heat in your home.
- Use ceiling fans to circulate air: For those without air conditioning, use ceiling fans or portable fans with the windows partially open to circulate fresh air into your home. For those with air conditioning, fans can be used to evenly distribute cool air.
- Use appliances wisely: Run appliances that produce heat (like clothes dryers, ovens and dishwashers) at night when its is cooler

By taking a few simple steps, we can be ready, stay safe, stay cool, and use less energy this summer.

## FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

Delaware City is vulnerable to coastal storms and flooding. A significant percentage of the town is located within the FEMA defined 1% chance flood plain. These areas are noted as Zone AE on the FEMA flood map and are particularly susceptible to flooding. Information on whether your property is in the floodplain, a Coastal A Zone, historic flood area, or has wetlands, can be obtained by coming to Town Hall, 407 Clinton Street, Delaware City DE 19706 or by calling 302-834-4573.



For information on flood protection, please contact Town Hall at 302-834-4573, or visit us at 407 Clinton Street, and our staff will help you by giving you advice on how to protect your property. Staff can also refer you to an agency that will visit your property to assess your property and tell you ways to protect your property, and in some incidents they can help you save on your Flood Insurance.

A few ways to protect your property from a flood hazard is to elevate your furnace above the base flood and to store your valuables and insurance papers upstairs in a waterproof container. You can also visit our website www.delawarecity.delaware.gov and click on Floodplain Management on the left side of the screen for more information about living in the flood plain.

Flash-flooding is the general type of flooding caused by the Canal and Dragon Run. For Delaware City, flooding will occur if there is a storm surge or if two or more high tides take place without an intervening ebb tide. **Turn around, don't drown!** It is very hard to judge just how deep flood waters can be. Designate a place where your family can meet if an evacuation order is issued.

Contact your insurance agent to see if you have flood insurance. Remember flood insurance only covers the structure. It does not cover your home's contents. Make sure you get the additional insurance for your contents. If you are a renter, you can get a Preferred Risk Flood insurance policy for your contents. Do not forget flood insurance does not go into effect for 30 days. Call your insurance agent today.

If you have to repair your home after a storm, or at any time and your property is in the floodplain, please contact Town Hall at 302-834-4573 to get a permit and find out ways to build back stronger including the mandatory elevations for your property. #### STORM WATER

As storm water runoff flows over land surfaces—pavements, yards, driveways, and roofs—it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water. In efforts to control storm water pollution, we must consider individual, household, and public behaviors and activities that can stop pollution from these surfaces. Here are some common individual behaviors you can do to help prevent storm water pollution:

- \* Always pick up your doggie's doo! Doggie doo can wash into our streams and rivers and introduce disease-causing bacteria.
- \* Pick up litter from your yard and storm drains.
- \* Use natural products whenever possible! Toxic substances like insect sprays and moth balls should be used as little as possible
- \* Plant more trees and flowers! It will make your yard more beautiful, and make it more difficult for chemicals to reach waterways.
- \* Recycle as much as possible!
- \* Check your vehicle for oil leaks and drips on a regular basis. When you find a leak, fix it promptly.
- \* Collect oil in containers with a tight fitting lid. Old milk jugs are perfect!
- \* Never dump motor oil, antifreeze or other engine fluids down the storm drain or into the ground.
- \* Wash your car at a car wash that filters water, this will prevent oil from your car from entering the ground water
- \* Use ground cloths under your vehicle whenever doing engine repair. Clean up all spills that happen in a timely matter.



#### TOWN CURFEW ORDINANCE

The Curfew Ordinance in City of Delaware City's Code prohibits any minor under the age of 18 to be permitted in the City limits without a parent after 10:00 p.m.

## PLANNING COMMISSION REQUIREMENTS

All residents requesting a subdivision, rezoning, or variance must submit two (2) sets of drawings to Town Hall and the City Manager must review them prior to being placed on a scheduled Planning Commission (PC) meeting agenda.

- The first set of measured drawings must show the property and building(s) as it currently exists
- The second set of measured drawings must depict the proposed changes to the property and building(s) and what the property will look like after the changes occur

  Drawings do not need to be to scale for initial consideration.



The requirement will give the Planning Commission enough time to review your plans prior to the meeting and help expedite their decision.

## HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

Property owners wishing to make alterations or new construction in the Historic District must submit an application with the following items to the HPC:

- Measured Drawings.
- Photographs.
- List and Samples of Materials.

The required information must be delivered to Town Hall and reviewed by the City Manager before the project can be placed on the HPC monthly meeting agenda. The HPC generally meets on the first Tuesday of each month. Watch for meeting notices posted in the Post Office, Library. Sunset Market and the Valero Station as well as on Delaware City's website: www.delawarecity.delaware.gov for meeting and/or changes.

## SUMMERTIME SAFETY

Your dog may love going with you in the car but summer is not the time to take him along even on short rides. Your car acts like a greenhouse, trapping the sun's heat and making it much hotter inside the vehicle than outside. It only takes minutes for the interior to reach dangerous temperatures. Example if it's 75 outside within 10 minutes the interior can reach 100. If its 85 outside within 30 minutes the interior can reach 120. If its 100 outside within 15 minutes the interior can reach 140. Fido will be much happier to welcome you home than ride along!!

### STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE



#### **TOWNWIDE STREET SWEEPING**

In accordance with our Stormwater Pollution Prevention & Management Plan, the City will be doing our semi-annual street sweeping of the whole City. The street sweeping will occur on **Tues & Wed, July 18th & 19**th. The schedule is as follows:

**TUESDAY**, **JULY 18th** the following streets will be swept: All streets that run North and South- Streets North of Fifth Street - **Second, Third, Fourth, Front, Williams, Canal, Solomon and Henry Streets**. Streets South of Fifth Street -in Harbor Estates **Seventh, Nowland, Cleaver, Warfel (Horse Shoe), and Clark**.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 19th the following streets will be swept: All streets that run East and West- Canal, Franklin, Bayard, Hamilton, Clinton, Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, and Monroe. South of Fifth Street-Hamilton Place, Clinton, Reybold, Warfel, and Clark.

We are asking that everyone remove their cars from the respective streets on the day that it will be swept so the sweeper can easily pass down the curb. By sweeping the streets twice a year, it will help to reduce the discharge of pollutants to the storm sewer system and protect the water quality of nearby streams, rivers, wetlands and bays. Thank you for your cooperation.
