### **NOTICE**

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR A REDUCTION ON YOUR CITY PROPERTY TAX
AND WATER RATES

With certain household income limitations, you may be eligible for a reduction on your city property tax and water rates during fiscal year 2021. (Beginning July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021)

The household income, excluding Social Security and disability pension, is limited to:

Single Applicant:

\$20,000

Married Applicants:

\$25,000 (combined income)

Household:

\$25,000 (total household income)

**You may be eligible** if you were 65 years of age or a disabled resident on SSI and have owned your current residence for one (1) year, by December 31, 2019, and your income does not exceed the limits above.

- 1. You must submit the following documents with your application: Copy of Federal Tax Form (1040) for 2019. If you do not file a Federal Tax Form, you must submit: a copy of 2019 Social Security Benefit Statements, a copy of 2019 interest statements, and a copy of 2019 pension statements if applicable.
- 2. Proof of income for all household residents over 18 years old
- 3. Certificate of Insurance Award if disabled
- 4. Proof of age and address (Matching items 1-3 above) shall be presented. These include
- 5. Picture ID, License, or Birth Certificate for homeowner applying for discount.

Applications for Exemptions are available at Town Hall. If you need assistance filling out the application please feel free to stop by Town Hall, and we will be glad to assist you. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30AM to 4:30PM.

PLEASE NOTE: This application form <u>and</u> the required documents must be submitted <u>every</u> <u>year</u> to demonstrate continued eligibility.

#### QUALIFICATIONS FOR MAYOR AND COUNCILPERSON

Any qualified voter of the City of Delaware City

- 1. Who is a qualified voter at least eighteen (18) years of age.
- 2. The "qualified voter" as used herein shall mean a person who is a registered voter with State of Delaware at the time that his/her nominating petition is filed.
- 3. Who is a United States Citizen.
- 4. Who has not been convicted of a felony as that crime is designated by the State of Delaware.
- 5. Who has established one (1) year residency in the City at the time their nominating petition is filed by furnishing identification and proof of residency.

#### **ELECTION VOTER QUALIFICATIONS**

#### Every person:

- 1. Who maintains their permanent place of residence within the City limits of Delaware City.
- 2. Who has reached the age of eighteen (18) years.
- 3. Who is a citizen of the United States.
- 4. Who is registered to vote under the State of Delaware's voter registration system maintained by the Department of Elections at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the Election.
- 5. Who can prove the foregoing information by proper identification.

You can register to vote at <u>Ivote.de.gov</u> and follow the instructions to register to vote. If you do not have a computer, you can come to Town Hall, 407 Clinton Street, during normal business hours (Mon-Fri 8:30-4:30) and we will help you register.

#### FLOOD HAZARD

Delaware City is vulnerable to coastal storms and flooding from the Delaware River, the C&D Canal, and the Dragon Run. Flash-flooding is the general type of flooding in Delaware City. Flooding will occur if there is a storm surge or if two or more high tides take place without an intervening ebb tide. It is very hard to judge just how deep flood waters are, so **Turn around, don't drown!** 



Delaware City has the program CODE Red. Register your information with the organization known as Code RED and you will be notified of any natural disaster such as floods, hurricanes and other weather related emergencies, in addition, notification for all hazardous events. In the case of an evacuation order, designate a place where your family can meet. Visit our website www.delawarecity.delaware.gov for tips on how to prepare for an emergency.

A significant percentage of the town is located within the FEMA defined 1% chance flood plain. These areas are noted as Zone AE on the FEMA flood insurance rate map (FIRM) and they are particularly susceptible to flooding. To find out if your property is in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), or the base flood elevation of your property, or to find more information for flood protection please call Town Hall at 302-834-4573 or visit the Town's website www.delawarecity.delaware.gov. You can also visit http://maps.dnrec.delaware.gov/FloodPlanning/default.html and find additional information if your property has any special flood related hazards

Contact your insurance agent to see if you have flood insurance. Remember flood insurance only covers the structure. It does not cover your home's contents. Make sure you get the additional insurance for your contents. If you are a renter, you can get a Preferred Risk Flood insurance policy for your contents. Remember flood insurance does not go into effect for 30 days after purchase. Call your insurance agent today.

A few ways to protect your property from a flood hazard is to replace your current furnace and elevate it above the base flood level. You can store your valuables and insurance papers upstairs in a waterproof container. You can also visit our website www.delawarecity.delaware.gov and click on Floodplain Management on the left side of the screen for more information.

You can contact DNREC (http://www.dnrec.delaware.gov/swc/drainage/pages/flooding.aspx) or FEMA (www.fema.com/federalemergencymanagementagency) to see if any grant money is available to elevate your home.

If you have to repair your home after a storm, or at any time, and your property is in the floodplain, you will need a building permit. Please contact Town Hall at 302-834-4573 to get a permit and find out ways to build back stronger. Don't build or grade within 10' from the property line so you do not alter the drainage between homes. This is one reason why you should only use licensed contractors who know the rules for building in the Floodplain.

We need to all work together to protect our Community and your property.

#### **STORMWATER**

As storm water runoff flows over land surfaces—pavements, yards, driveways, and roofs—it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water. In efforts to control storm water pollution, we must consider individual, household, and public behaviors and activities that can stop pollution from these surfaces. Here are some common individual behaviors you can do to help prevent storm water pollution:

- \* Always pick up your doggie's doo! Doggie doo can wash into our streams and rivers and introduce disease-causing bacteria.
- \* Pick up litter from your yard and storm drains.
- \* Use natural products whenever possible! Toxic substances like insect sprays and moth balls should be used as little as possible
- \* Plant more trees and flowers! It will make your yard more beautiful, and make it more difficult for chemicals to reach waterways.
- \* Recycle as much as possible!
- \* Check your vehicle for oil leaks and drips on a regular basis. When you find a leak, fix it promptly.
- \* Collect oil in containers with a tight fitting lid. Old milk jugs are perfect!
- \* Never dump motor oil, antifreeze or other engine fluids down the storm drain or into the ground.
- \* Wash your car at a car wash that filters water, this will prevent oil from your car from entering the ground water
- Use ground cloths under your vehicle whenever doing engine repair. Clean up all spills that happen in a timely matter.
